Monthly Membership Meeting & Lecture:

Tuesday, Jan 5, 7pm

"Palm Beach County's Natural Areas: A Great Success!" by Richard Moyroud, Owner Mesozoic Landscapes Native Plants Expert

About the speaker: After graduation from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, I established Mesozoic Landscapes, specifically to propagate and promote the great diversity of plants native to Florida, also offering consulting and landscape design with native plants. I have published many popular and scientific articles.

In 1981 I was a charter member of the Palm Beach County chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society, served two years as president, and for more than a decade I edited the FNPS newsletter. Our active FNPS chapter worked diligently to help pass two county bonds for land acquisition, leading to the purchase and conservation-based management of many high-quality natural areas. In 1995 the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners appointed me to the Natural Areas Management Advisory Committee, and I continue to serve to this day.

In 1984, the Exotic Pest Plant Council (EPPC) was formed; I was a board member and continue to educate the public about pest plants.

In 1985, I was hired to help create a private garden on 11 acres in Palm Beach (Gemini Botanical Garden), where I stayed until 1994. The plant species selected were native to our phytogeographic region and planted in groupings that reflected natural communities. Thus, species from Florida and nearby Caribbean islands resulted in a unique landscape adapted to the soils and climate of the region. Today, I collaborate with Fairchild Tropical Garden, Montgomery Botanical Center, and Atlanta Botanical Garden.

In 1986, as a charter member of the Association of Florida Native Nurseries (AFNN), I helped launch and edit the yearly guide to nurseries and plants. Still seeing problems with the correct use of natives in landscapes, we decided that a detailed guidebook was needed, so in 1991 the AFNN published "Xeric Landscaping with Florida Native Plants", written and edited by Michael Jameson and me.

In 1990, as conservation chair of the Florida Native Plant Society, I was appointed to the Endangered Plant Advisory Council, a state board under the Commissioner of Agriculture. The council evaluates and ranks species considered so close to extinction that they are listed as endangered or threatened in Florida. We also evaluate requests for grants (offered through the Division of Plant Industry) intended to help in research and recovery for the most critically endangered species. I still serve on EPAC, and have chaired the group since my initial appointment.

An Ag Reserve update: There will be several important issues that the Board of County Commissioners looks at in January. Please sign up for conservation updates so we can inform you of what is happening and what you can do to make a difference. One thing that really shocked me was that for all the Ag Reserve issues, the commissioners are only receiving about thirty e-mails or calls and basically always from the same people. They have made it harder to reach each commissioner by eliminating the e-mail “to all commissioners” so now you have to include each one's email address, but if you go to our website the addresses are all listed. I was a little slow, but after several issues I realized that the easiest thing is just to make a BCC group, saves a ton of time.

Another conservation issue to watch is the extension of State Road 7. We will need a lot of support on this as it threatens Grassy Waters and the water supply of West Palm Beach and the Town of Palm Beach.

VERO - WEST COUNTY WASTEWATER WETLANDS FACILITY

Everyone has heard of the Viera Wetlands in Brevard County, but did you know that Indian River County has a wetlands? Tucked away next to the interstate on 8th St. in Vero Beach is the West County Wastewater Wetlands Facility, Vero Wetlands if you will. The wetlands are open daily from 7 to 3. Treated waste water filters through 13 cells of varying depths and vegetation types, providing habitat for a wide variety of plants, birds, and animals. Grassy berms between the cells offer miles of easy walking and wildlife viewing. A cypress dome near the southern boundary hosts numerous water birds that roost every night. Early visitors can watch a parade of egrets, herons, and others leaving by the 100's, but many birds remain at the wetlands for all to see.

Unlike Viera Wetlands, access to this site is strictly by foot. Not to worry, though. The berms are easily traveled and there is lots to see, even within a short walk. I hope to see you out there. You never know what we might find!

Bird of the Month for January: Ruddy Turnstone

Kicking off this year's "shorebird series" of birds of the month is a strikingly patterned shorebird that is a regular and common wintering species here in Palm Beach County: Ruddy Turnstone (*Arenaria interpres*). One of the most widespread and common wintering shorebird species worldwide, RUTU prefers rocky coasts and shorelines where it can put to good use the foraging habit that gives it its common name: turning stones over with its bill. This habit, combined with its unusual shape, make it recognizable

from a fair distance. Pete Dunne, in his *Essential Field Guide Companion*, describes its appearance thus: "The body is pointy and ovate, shaped somewhat like a croissant. The head appears too small for the body; the bill is short, pointy, and seems very slightly upturned; and the bright orange legs are stumpy, comically short." The short legs are presumably responsible for its characteristic "waddling" gait.

Like several other shorebirds, it has a striking plumage pattern in flight, with bold outlines everywhere: a thick white stripe down the middle of the back and white stripes outlining the wings make it quite an eyeful, even in winter plumage. Dunne again: Its flight is "strong and direct, with stiff hurried wingbeats. Not particularly nimble, ruddy turnstone seems to require a braking effort or premeditated care when landing." This bird can be seen almost anywhere on our beaches or along the shores and docks of the Lake Worth Lagoon. There are records in every season, but it is least commonly found in summer.
